Computerization of 1990 Family History

The Dreibelbis Cousins of America genealogy from the 1990 John Jacob Dreibelbis Family of America has been entered into Family



as more updates are added. This should be every few months as the back log of information is loaded into the genealogy.

Tree Maker, along with over 11,000 cousins who were not in the 1990 book. Family Tree Maker is a genealogy database. In the next few weeks, the Dreibelbis genealogy will be available either on the Dreibelbis Cousins of America website or on Ancestry.com. Information on how to access the genealogy through the internet will be available on the DCOA website.

The genealogy on the website will be protected in such a way that the only information about living people will be their name. Birth dates and other personal information will not be made available to protect people's identity. After cousins have died, this information will be posted.

There are more than 7,188 Dreibelbis cousins who have unique numbers in the 1966 and 1990 Dreibelbis books. There are more than 7,188 because in the 1966 book a small number of cousins had numbers that ended with a letter, and I have not counted the number.

Cousins who were added to the genealogy in the 1990 book all were assigned a non-unique number, derived from their parents' numbers with the correct generation and an additional number at the end, for example, A-09-07126-01. These numbers are all in the electronic genealogy. In addition, cousins who have been added to the electronic genealogy have been assigned non-unique numbers in the same non-unique number format.

We now have over 18,700 Dreibelbis cousins loaded into the electronic genealogy and are continuing to add information from the updates that have been provided since 1990. About 10% of the updates are in the genealogy. Once the genealogy is available through the internet, we will periodically upload a revised version

The genealogy also has many people who are not Dreibelbis cousins but are related through marriage. This version of the genealogy was started by cousin Stanley Adams who entered all of his ancestors back many generations, so there are over 114,000 people in the genealogy. Some interesting information:

- There have been at least 158 marriages between Dreibelbis cousins
- Adopted children were not assigned Dreibelbis cousin numbers in the 1966 book. In the 1990 book, some were assigned numbers, but not all. In the electronic version, adopted children have been assigned numbers. If you find any that should have numbers, please notify Fred Polaski who will assign them numbers.
- Females are loaded by their maiden name. The method to search using names does not support searching for women by their married name.
- Cousins who are descended from two or more John Jacob's children have a number that starts with the letters from both branches of the family, e.g. J-M-09-0652-02. Cousins who are double Dreibelbises but both from the same branch only have one letter. There are many cousins in the Jacob branch who are double Dreibelbises.
- The descendants of John Jacob's four daughters who are recorded in the Dreibelbis genealogy are much fewer in number than the descendants of the three sons, probably because the Dreibelbis name was lost in the third generation.

If anyone has information on the descendants of John Jacob's daughters, please provide it to Becky Dreibelbis or Fred Polaski.

They grew up hearing PA Dutch all around and learned to understand it. When one thinks about it, it really is quite impressive that this Germanic dialect was the first language for most people in the area (including their mother and father) for over 250 years (7 or 8 generations), and that it was the common language in the communities of Berks and surrounding counties.

The secret is – how he designed and built the first ever truck-bed mobile missile launching system while working

as a mechanical engineer at Dayton's Wright Field (now Wright-Patterson Air Force Base) in 1945 – that led him to participate in the Ohio Department of the Aging's War Era Story Project. "I decided to tell my story because it's never been told before," said Dreibelbis, 94, of Kenwood, Ohio.

Dreibelbis Farm Historical Society Report

The Dreibelbis Farm Historical Society (DFHS) held its 1st Annual Farm Festival in conjunction with the Dreibelbis family reunion in 2012 which celebrated the 280th year since John Jacob Dreibelbis emigrated to the US. The festival featured craftsmen demonstrating period activities such as blacksmithing, quill pen writing, reverse glass painting, spinning and weaving, candle making, and butter making. There were butcher

house tours, environmental stations with blue bird house construction, hay rides, children's colonial games, and tours of the restored farm house. A 1½ mile walking trail was also established and was enjoyed by many. Also featured were lectures on Native American artifacts, the Civil War, Pa German immigration and Pa German Folk music. Many of the demonstrators stayed over for the reunion on Sunday. The farm festival was a great success with over 450 people in attendance between Saturday and Sunday. Founder Mark Dreibelbis says, "Thank you! We could not have done it without the many volunteers who helped to make this possible."

The 2nd farm festival is planned this year for Saturday, August 17, on the day before the reunion. This will be a one- day event with the traditional reunion on Sunday. Detailed planning is well underway and more exhibitors are lined up, as well as a variety of speakers. If you can come for the reunion a day early, stop by and enjoy the festivities.

The Historical Society scheduled its first wildflower walk on the property this May. The presentation was led by Frank Muzzapappa who is a neighbor and a retired biology professor with a vast knowledge of plants. Eleanor Dreibelbis also acted as an instructor



on the walk. This was the first time scheduling this event, and planners were delighted have 90 people show up! In addition, tours have been given to private groups such as Boy Scouts, The Red Hat Society, hiking clubs and historical

groups throughout the year. Please contact Mark Dreibelbis if you would like a private tour.


The board of directors of the DFHS was particularly busy this past year. They've reorganized and are meeting every two to three months. The Board is updating the by-laws to more clearly define our mission, discussing fundraising, and establishing policies for maintaining and upgrading the farm and all the exhibits. They are in the final stages of

getting a website up and running. Members of the board have met with consultants to determine how best to operate the foundation and how to care for the wealth of antiques and artifacts on the property.

The farm's pool of volunteers has been steadily increasing, with about 35 active volunteers helping to keep things running smoothly. We are always glad to have more volunteers to help

with maintenance or any of our special events. If you would like to get involved, please contact Mark Dreibelbis, president DFHS (mjdrei@verizon.net). Even fourlegged help is appreciated! Several goats and chickens have been donated to the farm. The goats are doing a great job of weed control!

On a less positive note, Hurricane Sandy was not kind to the Dreibelbis farm. Once the wind stopped we were left with a 40 foot section of the barn roof



blown off, part of the house chimney bricks knocked down, 3 large barn doors blown off and smashed, 1/3 of the slate roof of the tractor shed damaged, and the electric line to the barn down. Repairs are currently in progress. It looks like there will be a big gap between the cost of repairs and what the insurance will pay for.

We are hoping to schedule more events in the future and to continue to have the farm available to the public. We are so lucky to have this well preserved farm in our family to share our heritage with others.

Major Rehabilitation Project Planned for **Dreibelbis Station Covered Bridge**

As this Newsletter goes to print, a major \$1.8 million rehabilitation project of the Dreibelbis Station covered bridge has begun. According to the application for funding, this will preserve the historic resource and transportation connection for the enjoyment and use by future generations. All work will be coordinated through the Berks



bridge for continued vehicular use while preserving the geometry and appearance. Currently, bids for work have been solicited and by the

Museum Commission (PHMC) and PennDOT District 5-0 Historic Preservation Specialist. Paranormal investigation of the Historic Dreibelbis Farm

Michael had a flashlight go dead in the chicken house, despite having new batteries he had just put in. Janice was along in the house, she said it sounded like someone was moving furniture around upstairs. William likes to play with the toys that we left for him.

Jacob was all over the house and barn. He told us that he likes the way Mark is fixing up the farm. There are a lot of orbs in the barn. The barn was the most active location, with several spirits detected. They are still on the farm and are very friendly, and you can keep talking to them.



Directions to Historic Dreibelbis Farm

The farm is located on Rt. 143 between Rt. 78 and Rt. 222. From Rt. 78, exit at Lenhartsville and take Rt. 143 south. Pass "our" Dreibelbis Covered Bridge, then through Virginville. Look for Historic Dreibelbis Farm sign, about 200 yards on the right after you leave the village.

From Rt. 222, turn north at Moselem Springs (Sheetz gas station) onto Rt. 662. At the curve after the golf course, take Rt. 143 to the right 1.7 miles toward Virginville. Look on the left for a white sign at the lane to the farm just before the village of Virginville.
