Conversion of "Dreibelbis Family of America" Genealogy to Electronic Database Completed!

and a HUGE "Thank-you" to Fred Polaski

The Dreibelbis Cousins of America genealogy from the 1966 and the 1990 John Jacob Dreibelbis Family of America genealogy books has been entered into Ancestry.com. The genealogy includes all the Dreibelbis cousins in the 1990 Dreibelbis genealogy book, their spouses, and now over 4,600 additional cousins not formerly in our book. The name of the family tree in Ancestry.com is John Jacob Dreibelbis DCOA.

Ancestry.com is one of the largest genealogy websites and allows us to make the genealogy available to all cousins at no cost. It can be accessed at www. Ancestry.com. The genealogy on Ancestry. com is protected in such a way that for the general public the only information about living people will be their name. Birth dates and other personal information is not available to protect people's identity. Dreibelbis cousins can obtain access to additional information that is the same type of information that is included in the 1990 Dreibelbis genealogy book by contacting Fred Polaski at Polaski5@ comcast.net. Fred can "invite" cousins to give them access to more information such as Dreibelbis genealogy number, dates of birth, death, marriage, town of residence. etc. Cousins who are "invited" will have to register with Ancestry.com but there is no cost involved. Fred and Becky Mazzei are the only people who can make changes so if you see information that is incomplete or not correct, please email it to Fred or Becky.

The genealogy in Ancestry.com is being updated to add information that has been supplied since the last book was published in 1990. If you don't see information that was submitted, you can either wait until all the updates are entered, or you can send it again to either Becky Mazzei or Fred Polaski to make sure we have the latest

information. Because of some differences between the Family Tree Maker software Fred used to create the genealogy and the software in Ancestry.com, the Dreibelbis numbers and the stories about cousins in the 1990 book did not transfer into Ancestry. com. Fred is working at reloading this information, but that will take a while.

There are more than 7,188 Dreibelbis cousins who have unique numbers in the 1966 and 1990 Dreibelbis books. There are more than 7,188 because in the 1966 book a small number of cousins had numbers that were addended with a letter.

Cousins who were added to the genealogy in the 1990 book all were assigned a non-unique number, derived from their parent's number with the correct generation and an additional number at the end. For example, A-09-07126-01. These numbers will all be in the electronic genealogy. In addition, cousins who have been added to the electronic genealogy have been assigned nonunique numbers in the same non-unique number format.

We now have over 19,225 Dreibelbis cousins loaded into the electronic genealogy and are continuing to add information from the updates that have been provided since 1990. About 20% of the updates are in the genealogy.

Some interesting information:

- There have been at least 158 marriages between Dreibelbis cousins
- Adopted children were not assigned Dreibelbis cousin numbers in the 1966 book. In the 1990 book, some were assigned numbers, but not all. In the electronic version, adopted children have been assigned numbers. If you find any that should have numbers, please notify Fred Polaski who will assign them numbers.
- Females are loaded by their maiden name. The method to search using names does not support searching for women by their married name.
- Cousins who are descended from two or more of John Jacob's children have a number that starts with the letters from both branches of the family, e.g., J-M-09-0652-02. Cousins who are double Dreibelbises but both from the same branch only have one letter. There are a lot of cousins in the Jacob branch who are double Dreibelbises.

The descendants of John Jacob's four daughters who are recorded in the Dreibelbis genealogy are much fewer in number than the descendants of the three sons, probably because the Dreibelbis name was lost in the third generation. If anyone has information on the descendants of John Jacob's daughters, please provide it to Becky Mazzei.

Geocaching Activity Again Available at the 2014 Reunion

So what is Geocaching? Geocaching is a real-world, outdoor treasure hunting game using GPS-enabled devices. Participants navigate to a specific set of GPS coordinates and then attempt to find the geocache (container) hidden at that location. There are over 2 million geocaches hidden all over the world. The Dreibelbis Cousins hit five geocaches at last year's reunion and hope to do so again this year. Bring your equipment or just your smart phone and join in the fun!

How do I do it?

Visit geocaching.com, and enter your postal code. It will give you the coordinates of geocaches in your area. Use your GPS device to assist you in finding the hidden geocache. Also look for description and hints listed on the website. OR download the app from iTunes. Sign the logbook and return the geocache to its original location. You can share your "finds" online, and keep track of how many you've found.

What does a geocache look like?

Geocaches vary greatly in size and appearance. In the field you will see everything from large, clear plastic containers to tiny film canisters to a fake rock with a secret compartment.

What's in a geocache?

Usually there's a log you can sign, and sometimes trade items. If you take a trade item, you must leave one of equal value or greater (but no explosives, knives, food items, drugs, or alcohol). Some geocaches have "trackables" that you can take, and move to another geocache. You need to log the trackable on the geocaching website so that it can be tracked. Some geocaches have puzzles that will lead you to other locations.

So bring along your geocaching gear and have fun while also getting to explore the Historic Farm! Find Jean Davis at her activities' tent for coordinates and information.

Dreibelbis Cousins & California S.A.R

Dreibelbis cousins descended from patriots who fought in or aided the War for Independence 1775-1787 are eligible to join Sons of the American Revolution (SAR) or Daughters of the American Revolution (DAR). The SAR, founded July 4, 1876 in San Francisco, now has chapters around the world. Tony Bothwell, Sr., descendant of Berks County Militia Capt. Jacob Dreibelbis, is current president of SAR's founding chapter. Cindy Tam, whom Tony married on September 22, 2012 at Lakeside Presbyterian Church in San Francisco, holds the SAR flag in the photo on page 1 of the June 2013 Dreibelbis Cousins newsletter. (They attended the 2012 Dreibelbis reunion but missed the Greatest Distance Traveled award ceremony.) After their wedding reception at the Four Seas, Chinatown's oldest restaurant, Tony chaired a banquet commemorating the September 17, 1787 signing of the U.S. Constitution. Recording artists sang and bagpipes played. Post-9/11 veterans and first responders were honored. The Young American Patriots Fife & Drum Corps marched down Grant Avenue in the Autumn Moon Festival parade and upstairs to the SAR banquet. NASA Astronaut Ricky Arnold spoke. Dreibelbis Cousins from Virginia, Texas, California and British Columbia attended.

Fire in the Dreibelbis Homestead Cemetery

Michael Lafaver of Fleetwood PA, our cemetery caretaker, reported that there was a fire that burned off most of the grass at the cemetery and surrounding area. When he was asked about damage, he replied "none," it was just like "Uncle Paul" used to do each spring to burn off the dead weeds and let new grass grow up. He speculated that it could possibly have come from some heat generated by the




railroad cars or engines that pass several times a day. (The Paul to whom he referred was Paul Luther Dreibelbis (J 7-5221) who was DCOA President from 1966-1968. Paul was also involved in the refurbishment of the cemetery in 1932 when pipe rails and concrete pillars were installed around the entire area.



Dreibelbis Farm Historical Society Report

Looking Back at 2013 and Ahead Through the New Year

This past year has been an active and productive one for the Dreibelbis Farm Historical Society (DFHS) as we continued to develop and make available to the public this unique 18th century Pennsylvania German farmstead. A few milestones were reached, our number of volunteers grew, and



2013 Farm Festival

The 2nd annual Farm Festival last August was another huge success. Approximately 350 people were on hand to experience "life on the farm." This included a variety of crafts, skills and displays demonstrating early Pennsylvania German farm life. Our 2013 festival featured more displays and exhibitors; and next year we hope to include even more. The success of the festival is entirely dependent on our dedicated volunteers who work tirelessly and with great enthusiasm to produce the event.

Restoration

Work continues on the brick chicken house to restore and develop it into a museum display area and multi-purpose building for historical workshops and meetings. This is a big task. The dirt floor will be dug down to allow wood flooring to be installed. The windows are being totally refinished/rebuilt. Roof insulation, electricity, and heating and air conditioning will complete the project. We are so fortunate that Bill Thomas donated his time to saw the floorboards. We now have over 1,200 board feet of red oak flooring drying in the barn! Other projects included clearing and organizing areas of the barn and improving the butcher house display. We are trying to progress with the cataloging and documentation project that was started by Jenna Hepner to provide an inventory of the artifacts in the house.

Wish List

- Pressure treated lumber— 2x4, 2x6, 2x8, 2x10, and 2x12.
 Also, 5/4 deck boards (1"). (We'll take used lumber. Boards may have nails and screws in them.)
- Garden Tools— shovel, rake, pruner clippers, digging iron, lawn mower, leaf blower, brush trimmers, weed whacker.
- Hand Tools— hammer, saw, wrench, screwdriver, pliers, etc.
- Electrical— wire of all gauges, service panel, conduit.
- Plumbing— ¾ HP submersible well pump, water lines, PVC pipe.
- Fasteners— screws, nails, bolts, nuts, washers.
- If you have any of these items that you are not using, please consider donating them to the DFHS. We can arrange for pickup. If you have any questions about donating items not on the list, don't hesitate to contact us.



Volunteer Opportunities

The DFHS functions exclusively through the efforts of volunteers. We have no paid staff. Who would be a likely volunteer? Anyone who has a strong desire to preserve farmland and open spaces, a strong interest in history, a connection to farming, a love of nature and environmental preservation, or a love of teaching and demonstrating crafts or skills. you are looking for a worthwhile activity, a great group of people to join, or if you're are a skilled craftsman or tradesman who would like to "give back" to the community, we would love to have you join us. This year for the first time we organized a fund raising appeal. A letter was sent to everyone who had expressed interest in the DFHS. The appeal was a great success; we raised over \$2,000.00. We very much appreciate all who supported this appeal. We also have been collecting Redners' receipts from which they donate 1% of the total sales to the DFHS. This is an easy way for us to raise funds, so please consider participating!

Programs and Activities in 2014

In February 2014, we presented an ice harvesting demonstration. Over 80 people braved the harsh winter conditions to watch ice blocks being cut from the ice pond and stacked in the ice house. We hope to still have ice from this on August 23 for the Farm Festival to make hand cranked ice cream. Come to the festival and see if it lasted that long. Twenty nature-lovers spent a muddy, rainy April evening with guest naturalist, Richard Bonnett on a walk into our wetlands to hear and see spring peepers, the tiny frogs which live in our swamps by the thousands. Washed by an evening downpour, the old farmhouse glistens in dusky twilight as the tree frogs sing their song. Planned for Mid Summer – Wildflower/Invasive species walk and lecture by botanist, Frank Muzopappa.



Dreibelbis Cane Donated



An unusual cane with an interesting story has been given for display in the museum of Dreibelbis artifacts at the Dreibelbis Farm in Virginville.

It started with a phone call from Natalie Calhoun-Duggan of Rifle, Colorado. She found the cane in her father's home in Walls, Mississippi after a "devastating" fire. The cane was formed from laurel wood found in Josephine County, Oregon by Gale F. Dreibelbis in 1930, and made into a cane by his brother W. A. Dreibelbis who decreed: "I desire this cane be the property of those whose name is Dreibelbis so long as it shall remain on earth." The cane passed to Wright Martin Dreibelbis in Wisconsin. Upon

his death, Natalie Calhoun-Duggan's father came into possession of the cane. Luckily it survived the fire and "still remains on the earth."

Our thanks to Natalie Calhoun-Duggan for donating the cane to display for "those whose name is Dreibelbis"!

Butcher fork with wooden handle by Jane Wenrich, from family cabin in Millersburg, PA. On the handle is the inscription "J.W. & D.R. Dreibelbis, Millersburg, PA" and "All Kinds of Meats." We do have a cousin named Jacob W. Dreibelbis (A-05-00691) of Millersburg PA who owned a butcher shop. He died in 1930 and had two sons, Daniel and Ralph, who were in the butcher business also, and likely were the D. and R. on the handle.

Family Bible Returns to Virginville

The donation of a family Bible by David Nevin Dreibelbis (J8-6881) of Spring City, Pa, completes a long journey and returns the Bible to its roots in Virginville.

It started with the marriage of Francis F. Dreibelbis to Sarah Luckenbill (J5-11071) in 1888 when they received the Bible as a wedding present. Their son, Raymond Dreibelbis married Katie Seidel (from the next farm east of the Jacob B. Homestead Farm at Virginville along Rte 143) and had four children, one of which was Nevin, father of David Nevin Dreibelbis.

As David N. Dreibelbis was thinking what would eventually become of the Bible, he decided it would be fitting for it to return to its origin in Virginville. Our thanks to David for this donation, and we look forward to it being displayed along with other family artifacts in the farmhouse. Come to the Reunion and check it out!

Directions to Historic Dreibelbis Farm

From Rt. 222, turn north at Moselem Springs (Sheetz gas station) onto Rt. 662. At the curve after the golf course, take Rt. 143 to the right 1.7 miles toward Virginville. Look on the left for a white sign at the lane to the farm just before the village of Virginville.
