Restoration Project Underway

The restoration experts continue to make progress on the renovation of the 172'6" Dreibelbis Covered Bridge. At this time last year they were just making final plans for the project and to-date are progressing on schedule.

Throughout last summer the roof and siding were carefully removed, all piece by piece! By the first week of September it was ready to be lifted in full length sections off the foundation and laid to the side. A flat stretch of rock and gravel had been created on the west side against the bank and sticking out into the creek. When the giant crane arrived, this is when the sections of the two sides with the Burr Arches all intact, and the flooring structure were each lifted and set down.

Every single piece was individually numbered prior to dismantling. The entire bridge was then loaded onto flat-bed tractor trailers and taken to the reconstruction site in York County, PA.

What then continued through late fall and the winter was reconstruction of the walls and flooring. After all was laid out at the work area, each piece was assessed as to its strength and condition, with all unsuitable pieces removed and an "exact" replacement made and fit into the structure. Fortunately, through the constant contact of cousin Lester Miller with the crew foreman, a bus trip was set-up to go over to view the site and progress being made on fitting together the new sections. The precision of the work was impressive--but most intriguing was that the same process had to be done on-site back in 1872 without the convenience of modern-day power tools. -continued on page 2

As of this writing, the wooden undercarriage and side-wall sections are being lifted back into place on top of steel weight-supporting beams that will increase the weight limit to 20 tons. Hopefully by Reunion time, there will be an impressive structure on-site. Reunion attendees will want to take a short three mile drive north along the Maiden Creek (Route #173) to check out the progress!



Profiles from the Past

A regular column looking at eccentric or noteworthy relatives from the past.

Hannah K. Dreibelbis Hoch Restored Family Cemetery in 1832

Most cousins have heard about the restoration of the Dreibelbis family cemetery in 1932 at the time of the 200 year anniversary, but did you know that Hannah K. Dreibelbis Hoch restored the cemetery in 1832? From the 1990 Dreibelbis family book:

Mrs. Hoch had been the last of the original Daniel Dreibelbis Family folks who had been interested in the matters of the Old Dreibelbis Homestead Farm and Cemetery after it had been sold to the Shollenberger Family: as she had been the last of the Dreibelbis Folks to have the "Dreibelbis Burial Grounds" on the farm repaired. That was in 1832, and she had gone to quite a lot of trouble and expense as she had built a fence clear around the lot and had straightened out all of the grave markers and had planted Lillies of the Valley on the entire lot so as to keep the weeds and thorns from spreading.

Samuel L. Droibelbis

First Dreibelbis Cousin to Take Interest in Family Tree

Samuel L. Dreibelbis (J-04-00248, born 3-25-1848, died April 13, 1921) was the first Dreibelbis cousin to take an interest in the Dreibelbis family tree. Samuel was a physician, graduating from Hahnemann Medical College in Philadelphia in 1871. He practiced in Reading PA for many years was the Obstetrician at the Homeopathic Hospital in Reading. He was very involved with the First Evangelical Church of Reading where he was the Sabbath School Superintendent for 18 years. From the 1990 Dreibelbis family book:

Dr. Dreibelbis also had spent some time in Europe where he had made a careful search of the origin of the Dreibelbis name and the birthplace of the immigrant, Johann Jacob Dreibelbis, but for some unknown reasons the data that he had gathered got lost and therefore much of the information that he had could not be located. When the compiler of these articles had asked the daughters of Dr. Dreibelbis about the data, they told him that it was thrown out into the scrap and burned.

Daniel R. Dreibelbis Farmer in State College, PA

Daniel R. Dreibelbis (A-MM-05-00344), son of Martin (A-04-00131) and Hannah Rothermel (MM-04-00072) Dreibelbis, was born in Richmond Township, Berks County, Pennsylvania. When he was twelve years of age his parents moved to Millheim, Center County, Pennsylvania where he grew to manhood and where he worked on his father's farm until he went to work for himself.

Daniel was a farmer and owned and operated a large farm at State College, Pennsylvania, which now is part of the Penn State University campus golf course. In 1976, in celebration of the 200th anniversary of the United States, four of his great grandsons (Jack H. A-08-05743, Donald A. A-08-05744, Galen E. A-08-05745, and Dan A. A-08-05746a Dreibelbis) erected a stone monument on the foundation of the original homestead at State College, PA. The monument was built with stone collected from farms that were owned by the Dreibelbis clan from all corners of Pennsylvania. The monument honors the John Jacob Dreibelbis Cousins of America.

Marriages to Distant Cousins Kissing Cousins???

The Dreibelbis family tree includes at least 183 marriages between Dreibelbis cousins. Although many of these marriages were between distant cousins who were known to each other as cousins, some of these marriages were between distant cousins who did not learn they were related until after being married for many years. One of these marriages was between Jason F. Dreibelbis (J-08-06670), the former President of the Dreibelbis Cousins of America, and Eleanor Jane Moyer (MM-08-00365b). They were married in 1948. After raising 3 sons and both Jason's and Eleanor's retirement from the field of education, they purchased the farm where Eleanor was born in Mertztown, PA. When Eleanor researched her family history she learned in 1990 that she was a descendant of Mary Magdalena Dreibelbis, through the family tree of Rothermel, Deisher, Schelgel, and Moyer, and is also descended from Merkel, Schaeffer, Rohrbach, Bush, and Fox, all of German descent. That makes her children not only Dreibelbis cousins, but double cousins on both sides.

Charles B. BreyfogelBishop, United Evangelical Church of the Eastern Conference

Many Dreibelbis cousins have become ministers of many different Protestant religions, but of special note is Charles B. Breyfogel (C-05-00529). In 1875, Charles entered the ministry of the United Evangelical Church of the Eastern Conference and in 1891 became a Bishop of the church. When the Czar of Russia issued the edict of religious tolerance, Bishop Breyfogel traveled to Russia and personally secured recognition from the Russian authorities for the planting of the Evangelical church in Russia.

Joseph M. Dreibelbis A Family of Adventurers! (And beware of those Dreibelbis boys!)

Joseph M. Dreibelbis (M-04-00179) was born in Schuykill Haven, as were his 10 children, but later he and his wife moved the family to Naperville, IL and then Eureka, KS. Some of his children were even more adventurous. Son Franklin (M-05-00763) traveled to Australia where he married and raised horses, then returned and lived in Los Angeles. Son Charles (M-05-00764) lived in Alaska and several other countries, then returned to the United States and settled in Montana where he operated a large cattle ranch known as "Rock Hill Ranch." Son George (M-05-00765) traveled the world and settled in Alaska where he was U. S. Marshall. Son Charles (M-05-769) was not as adventurous as his older brothers, but was in the drug store business in Eureka KS, Dallas TX, and Butte Montana. In Montana he ran a wholesale pharmaceutical business that supplied all the retail drugs to stores in Montana and Idaho, along with being in business with his brother Charles on the Rock Hill Ranch. Son Martin (M-05-00771) worked in Waco TX, Dallas TX, and was in Butte Montana in his brother Louis's store when it was robbed. Brothers Charles and George were also there when a pair of the toughest robbers in the west tried to rob the store at gun point, but the Dreibelbis brothers got the better of them and beat them so badly the robbers were glad when the police arrived to arrest them.

We recently acquired two deeds, one from Seth Dreibelbis to Milton S. Leiby and one from Jacob and Magdalena Dreibelbis to Milton S. Leiby. These deeds including property transfers in "Virginsville, Berks Co, Pa." are from 1894 and 1904 respectively, and were gifted to us specifically by Sheryle Baer. We are very grateful that the DCOA is considered worthy of family artifacts and donations. These deeds and other artifacts will be on display during the 288th Reunion.

While you're checking out these items, please check out all the other amazing items we have in the Artifacts tent (see page 5). There is an elaborate Bible from approximately 1888, feed bags, platters and dishes, birth and deed certificates, and family photos.

Dreibelbis Farm Historical Society

We are moving ahead! The past year was an active one as we continued to preserve and protect this 18th century treasure of family history, and present it to the public for educational, historical, environmental, genealogical, and archeological purposes.

Traditional programs that took place were well attended. The Farm Festival in August was again a great success. The Fall Family event with bonfire and

hayride had close to 90 people. The ice harvesting demonstration this February was unfortunately during a mild stretch of weather and there was no ice to cut. But the event still drew 60+ visitors as we talked about tools and the history of ice harvesting. The late winter walk where we do maintenance on our wood duck boxes was squeezed in just before the State shut down. Over 60 people participated and 2 screech owls also attended!

Unfortunately, due to the PA shutdown, both the spring peeper and wild flower walks were cancelled. We also had our first-time barn dance/ hoe down scheduled for the end of May but this was also cancelled. At this time, we are still uncertain if the August 22 Farm Festival will be held. A decision will be made by July 26. Keep your eye on the website, dreibelbisfarm.org. or check us out on Facebook for further info.

Farm work on 180 acres can occur while practicing social distancing.

We have lots of room to spread out so many of our maintenance and cleanup activities have continued.

A self-guided wildflower and native plant trail has been created by relative, Dick Miller of Topton and his friend Plummer Dunkle. Participants can follow the trail map to the plant locations.
